MILLBROOK COUNCIL MEETING - Jan. 2, 1973.

Reeve Northey and Councillors P. Beyer, K.H. Blair and P.E. Hamilton present.

The business transacted - A parking sign is to be placed at Centre St. west side of Tupper Street, King Street to Centre street for parking.

Mr. Hale of Hale's Disposal spoke to council re collection and disposal of garbage. Containers suggested for garages and factories, \$1.00 per yard for containers. Limit of bags per household - within reason. Both ways we look after in waste disposal area or Hale's look after.

Clifford Scott reported on roads, which are to be sanded as soon as possible.

Complaints were received about snowmobiles on sidewalks and private property.

Prices to be obtained for contract bids for snow removal. Dumping snow in the Creek will plug same.

Moved by Councillor Hamilton, seconded by Councillor Blair that Councillors Beyer and Blair be authorized to attend convention of Rural Municipalities Association - rate of remuneration to be \$20.00 per day.

Moved by Councillor P. Hamilton, seconded by Councillor P. Beyer that the Clerk inform Mrs. C.D. Cutmore that we have no obligation to pay for boarder at her home.

The grant to the Library Board was fixed at \$1200.00. Insurance was reduced on the library building and increased on contents.

In the event of a heavy snowfall the arena will be closed.

The following bills were paid Imperial Oil Ltd. \$240.00 Bill's Excavating \$220.00, Van DeBor Paving \$782.50, St. John's Ambulance Brigade \$10.00, Ontario Heart Fund \$15.00.

The sad looking tattered flags on the Municipal Building have been replaced with new unfaded ones and this greatly enhances the appearance of King Street, in that area.

CAVAN COUNCIL MEETING:

The regular monthly meeting was held on February 8th - all members present.

On motion any member of council was delegated to attend the Community Recreational seminar at Sir Sanford Fleming College on Saturday Feb. 24 from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m.

Frank Westheuser was given permission to obtain a building permit to establish a machine shop on the Fallis Line. Lot 10, Con. 6 Cavan Twp. A letter will be forwarded to the Dept. of Transportation and Communication seeking approval on the supply of calcium chloride and old oil for 1972.

The road employees were in to meet Council seeking a raise in pay. The Reeve informed them that it would be dealt with at a special meeting. Garnet Whitfield waited on council asking it to prepare a brief asking that the three municipalities of South Monaghan, Cavan and Millbrook be included in Peterborough County for educational purposes, if the three municipalities become part of Peterborough County.

Bell Telephone was given permission to run a heavy underground cable along private property along the 9th Concession of Cavan.

Ted McDowell and Ken Clark requested permission from Cavan Council to hold a Fair on Sunday for the Agricultural Society. Council asked them to present a resolution, passed by the directors, at Council's meeting on Feb. 15th.

Charles Lunn waited on Council to request permission to establish a trailer camp in Cavan Township on Lot 18 Con. 6. Mr. Lunn was referred to the Dept. of Health - and to report at the next meeting.

Mrs. Smith reported a total of \$7,227.46 taxes collected in January.

Mr. Hilbert Flokstra was appointed to look after the dump on a two week trial basis.

A resolution will be prepared asking that if and when Cavan Township, South Monaghan Township and the Village of Millbrook become part of Peterborough County that they have the same representation as they had on the Northumberland and Durham County Council, according to the Municipal Act.

Twenty dollars prize money, from the Baptie Scholarship fund, will be given to North Cavan school for three prizes for a public speaking contest.

Donald Cathcart was appointed for one year to the Otonabee Region Conservation Authority and Luther Olan for one year to the Ganaraska Conservation Authority.

Garageman Ken Foottit who towed the car into Millbrook described it as "the worst smashed-up car" that he had moved in the last fifteen years.
