Another sign of spring is the arrival of the gorgeously illustrated seed catalogues. These turn peoples minds to thoughts of gardening and when they think of flower beds and lawns they think unpleasant things about roaming dogs. So Millbrook council - to the rescue:

"Whereas it is deemed expedient for the protection of the inhabitants of the Village of Millbrook to pass this by-law (No. 929) to provide for the licensing and requiring the registration of dogs and for imposing a license fee on the owners thereof, and generally for regulating the running at large of dogs in the municipality of the Village of Millbrook.

Now, therefore, it is enacted as a by-law of the corporation of the Village of Millbrook, as follows:-

Every owner of a dog shall register on or before the First day of April each dog owned by him in the Village of Millbrook, with the Village Clerk and at that time pay to such Village Clerk the license fee prescribed.

Every person who becomes the owner of a dog on or after the First day of April in each year shall register the same and pay the license fee therefor as provided.

A tag shall be supplied by the Clerk for each dog which is registered hereunder, and the owner shall keep the tag securely fixed on the dog at all times during the year and until he procurs a tag for the following year.

No dog shall run at large within the corporate limits of the Village of Millbrook and the owner of any dog running at large within the corporate limits shall be guilty of a breach of this by-law.

For this purpose of this by-law a dog shall be deemed to be running at large when found off his owner's premises and not under the control of any person. Any dog on a leash shall be deemed to be under control.

Every dog running at large within the corporate limits of the Village of Millbrook may be destroyed by the By-law Enforcement Officer, and the carcass shall be disposed of to the satisfaction of the Medical Officer of Health for the United Counties of Northumberland and Durham.

Any person who contravenes the provisions of this by-law shall, upon conviction, be liable to a penalty of not more than fifty dollars, exclusive of costs, and every such penalty shall be recoverable under the provision of the Summary Conviction Act.

ONTARIO PROVINCIAL POLICE REPORT:

Two Weekend Accidents Investigated by Local Detachment.

A two car accident on March 3rd on Highway 115 at the Fallis Line Road caused over \$1,000 damage. The cars involved were driven by Americo Ferri of Nairn Avenue, Toronto and Charles J. Armstrong of Oshawa. The Ferri car left Highway 115 in the heavy fog and struck the front left area of the other automobile which was stopped on Con. 5-6 Road. Cuts and bruises were sustained by Estelle Gagnon and Anne M. Jesso, both of Toronto, passengers in the Ferri car and by Anne M. Armstrong of Oshawa, passenger in the other vehicle. Damage to the Ferri car was estimated at \$550.00 and \$500.00 to the other.

Patrick Toms of R.R. No. 1 Campbellcroft was the driver of a car that was forced off the road by a second car at about 5.00 a.m. on March 4th. A week ago this team was 58 seconds away from playoff elimination and facing a two goal deficit. UNCOOKED PEANUT BUTTER CANDY

- 1 cup smooth peanut butter
- 1 cup corn syrup
- 1 1/2 cups skim milk powder
- 1 1/2 cups sifted icing sugar
- 3/4 cup finely chopped salted nuts

Cream peanut butter and corn syrup together with a wooden spoon. Add milk powder and icing sugar and blend, first with a spoon and then with hands until well mixed. Put on board coated with icing sugar and knead with hands until very smooth. Shape into 2 rolls about 1 inch in diameter and dip each roll into finely chopped peanuts. Chill and slice.
