OLD TIME BETHANY BALL PLAYER DIES.

TOM STAPLES, CATCHER IN THE FAMOUS 'BROTHER BATTERY OF BETHANY' DIES.

Word was received here on Monday of the death of this well known citizen of Bethany.

Possibly best remembered around Millbrook for his baseball playing prowess, Tom was one of the key men in a team that brought a lot of victories and glory to Bethany. Teamed with his brother, Charlie, a pitcher they matched and very often outmatched the best in the area.

(Ed. note - I was just breaking into senior ball, as a school kid, about the time Tom was retiring but I can give personal testimony to the fact that the road to home plate wasn't a very 'cushy' trip when Stalwart Tom was guarding it.)

MILLBROOK PAIR FACE MANY CHARGES:

About fifteen charges of break-in and four of arson have been laid against James Dolan, who moved to Millbrook from Bowmanville and Allan Budny, who came from Goderich to live in the house opposite the South Gravel Road on King Street.

The seizure of stolen property following their arrest has cleared case in the areas policed by the Whitby, Peterborough, Newcastle, Lindsay and Cobourg Detachments. Some of the goods were recovered by divers from Lake Ontario and from the Garden Hill pond.

ORV. WAINMAN ENTERTAINS AT TAMMY SHOW.

Orv. Wainman - "the little guy with the big voice" was one of the stellar attractions at Peterborough's Tammy Show, on Sunday. Orv's father had a jewellery shop in Millbrook and combined this with a hobby of raising exotic birds, on the north west corner of Union and Centre Streets. On one of my R. and R.'s (rest and recreation) periods in Millbrook Orv. appointed me his unofficial, unqualified and unpaid business manager. He was then just breaking in to show business and we entered him in the Ken Soble Amateur Show - a Sunday morning feature on G.F.R.B. Orv. won the contest, prize, a watch. You know what followed - the crash of fortunes; the long line of idle men appealing for help; the rising clamour of discontent, and the constant bitter argument concerning the cause of all our troubles."

And, another quote by Sir Percy Bate from an earlier issue of a 1930 Millbrook paper - "There is war to-day, universal war. The weapons are not navies, armies or airplanes, but tariffs, quotas and shifting currencies".

Rather close parallels with the depression years of the Dirty Thirties and the present time. Yes?????

RECIPE FOR CALGARY CASS-E-ROLLS

1½ lb lean minced beef	1 egg slightly beaten
½ cup fine bread crumbs	½ cup milk
¼ cup minced onion	¾ cup tomato catsup
1 tsp salt	1 19 oz can pineapple tidbits
½ tsp dry mustard	

Method: Mix beef, crumbs, onion, salt, mustard, egg and milk. Shape 48 one inch balls. Place in lightly oiled casserole. Bake at 350 degrees for 30 minutes, stirring meatballs to brown evenly. Drain fat. Blend catsup & undrained pineapple and pour over meat balls. Bake until bubbly. 6-8 servings. Delicious served over fluffy rice.
