## MILLBROOK AGRICULTURE SOCIETY MEETING:

This organization had a lengthy meeting on Monday March 19th in the Cavan Municipal hall.

At this meeting tentative approval was given to a plan, submitted on behalf of the Recreation Committee, for the installation of flood-lights in Exhibition Park, subject to conditions acceptable to the Fair Board.

Plans will be forwarded to the provincial Department of Agriculture of a building to replace the one destroyed by fire. This will be an 18 by 18 ft. structure. The basement, to the level of the events announcers floor will be cement blocks. The basement will be used either for the Secretary's office or for washrooms and athletic equipment storage. After Department approval bids will be called for its construction.

Consideration was also given to bleacher seats and one three decker section will be built to establish a target price. When this is determined a decision will be made regarding an extension of this seating arrangement.

## ONTARIO PROVINCIAL POLICE - WEEKLY REPORT:

The local detachment investigated one one-car accident, which happened about 4.30 P.M. on Saturday Mar. 17, on Highway 115 1.4 miles north of Pontypool Rd. Durham Rd. #17. The car was driven by NG Hung Chee of Don Mills, and went out of control on slush-covered highway, into the ditch and overturned. Damage was estimated at \$600.00

### OPP REPORT 43 KILLED - SNO MOBILES.

In spite of repeated warnings the death toll in snow vehicles continues to rise. With the end of the season in sight, ice conditions will become increasingly dangerous and if care is not taken more lives will be lost. In the period from September 1972 to Feb. 27, 1973 there were 36 fatal accidents, with 43 people killed, made up of 34 drivers and 9 passengers.

### DRIVERS -

One of the problems of winter driving is road splash. The Ontario Provincial Police reminds you to make sure you always wipe road splash off of headlights as well as off windshields and windows. Road splash - one of the headaches of winter driving - can cut your headlight efficiency way down - so always make it a rule to clean road splash off your headlights before and after every trip. See better - be seen better - and be safer.

Facts prove that when fastened, automobile seat belts are saving lives and preventing serious injuries. Seat belts are now accepted as part of your car's equipment - but they're no good unless fastened every time you move the car. Make it a rule to never sit on your seat belts, but to ALWAYS fasten them!
