## LIONS SCORE BIG SUCCESS-, PANCAKES SELL LIKE HOTCAKES:

The weatherman, who usually smiles on the Lions and Lionettes on the dates of their annual Maple Syrup Festival, beamed on them this year on both Saturday and Sunday, with the latter, in particular, being a real pretty day.

Attendance figures, building up from year to year, broke all records with an estimated 4000 visitors.

The local 'Aunt Jemimas' fed hungry line-ups for hours and SRO (sold right out) summed it all up.

A Toronto Sunday School class arrived early, held their service, in the maple bush and then joined in the festivities. Many people took advantage of the delay to take a walk in the area and one woman was heard to exclaim "it's a long time since I had a tramp in the woods".

Three tractor drawn wagons were kept busy giving the youngsters the de luxe tour and pony rides were also on the program. A local blacksmith gave a demonstration of horseshoeing and the Frontier Villagers were there in cowboy outfits and Civil War (U.S.) garb.

The helicopter giving riders an aerial view of the village had more take-offs than the combined totals logged by Sally Rand and Gypsy Rose Lee who used to risk pneumonia on the illuminated theatre runways, in the furtherance of their art.

Sally operated with a huge balloon known as her 'bubble' and when she appeared at Loew's Theatre in Toronto, the Good, the lighting was so subdued that the ushers almost missed a young chap, headed up the aisle with a sling shot, who had the evil intention of perking up the performance. Gypsy operated with feathers and at the conclusion of her performance she moulted.

## ONTARIO PROVINCIAL POLICE REPORT:

On April 14th at 3.15 a.m. a panel truck driven by Jeffrey P. Smith of St. Catharines caught fire, while eastbound on Highway 115. Damage to the vehicle was \$350.00

On April 15 at 10.35 p.m. a motorcycle driven by Lawrence King of Brampton caught fire and burned. Damage to the vehicle was \$500.00

Copper wire theft - On April 9th at 1.35 p.m. the theft of copper wire was reported stolen from the CPR right of way on the 10th line of Cavan. Approximately 325' was stolen with an approximate value of \$35.00

The investigating officer was Con. A.C. Allison of the Millbrook detachment.

## BICYCLE SAFETY:

The increased popularity of bicycles is once again becoming apparent on Ontario highways. Unfortunately, the popularity of these vehicles has also resulted in bicycle collisions, death and injuries to bicyclists.

In 1971 there were four hundred and fifty nine collisions involving bicycles. These collisions resulted in the death of thirty four bicyclists and injuries to another three hundred and twenty six. In 1972 collisions increased to five hundred and four causing death to thirty five bicyclists and injuries to four hundred and twenty two others.

Under the provisions of the Highway Traffic Act a bicycle is a vehicle and as such is subject to all the rules of the road which govern the operation of a motor vehicle and violation of these make him liable to prosecution. If you ride a bicycle it is your responsibility to know the law governing the operation of it and the equipment that must be carried on a bicycle.
