MEET THE CANDIDATES MEETING -

A near capacity crowd was in the Cavan council chamber to hear the candidates in the Monday run for council.

Present members, Ken Blair, Perc Hamilton and Robert Ridge all asked for voter support on the strength of their previous records and newcomers to the municipal political field brought no startling platforms to the meeting. Bob Carr quoted some of his supporters in describing him as a "doer" not an orator and said he would devote his energies to the betterment of the community. Gerald Deyell also pledged his best efforts in the interests of the village.

Lyle Nattress said that if he was elected he would "have a voice in council and that it would be heard".

Eric Warburton, a one year resident of the village, explained that he was interested in serving on council and serving the citizens.

Some heat was generated in an exchange between Norm Smith and Percy Martin, and Reeve Northey, who for some reason was chairing the meeting instead of an independent chairman.

To put a "you did", "we didn't" argument in its proper perspective the Chronicle quotes an authoritative article from the Globe and Mail.

Under the heading "Court Orders Councils To Call Hearings On Every Proposal Affecting The Public" - "The Ontario Divisional Court has issued a precedent-setting decision requiring municipal councils and planning boards to provide a forum to hear citizens on any public proposal which might directly or indirectly affect them.

The decision affects the majority of Ontario municipalities, which now revise official plans for land use and which pass rezoning by-laws without notifying or necessarily hearing affected citizens. But the language of the decision also affects every Ontario municipality by requiring them to seek out and hear citizens on any municipal proposal which would "alter conditions" in the municipality.

Later, in the article - "the decision says (majority decision written by Chief Justice Dalton Wells) that municipal councils affecting the rights of ratepayers, must act judiciously, by notifying and hearing any representations the affected people make".

And another relevant paragraph further in the article " And, until the Division Court decision yesterday, there was no legal requirement or implication that council seek public hearings on public proposals which don't deal directly with land use."

NOTE TO SENIOR CITIZENS:

There is a proposal on foot to permit municipalities to make tax rebates on their local tax assessments. There will likely be particulars in to-morrow's papers. So, before casting your vote on Monday ask the candidates how they stand on this measure. The village has never done anything for you and this is an opportunity to correct this situation. Keep a record of their answers.

We had intended asking at the meeting on Tuesday if any member of council even knew the name of the fund available for Senior Citizen projects. It's New Horizons but we doubt if any action was taken locally.
