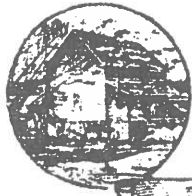

HARRY WILLIAMS, MILLBROOK NATURALIST:

Harry Williams, who teaches science at Millbrook High School, is also an avid naturalist. He spent three weeks of his holidays this summer collecting and identifying plants of the liverwort family in Newfoundland. This is the first time such a checklist of this kind has been made on the island. He worked out of St. John's, going as far north as Twillingate. He reports that there were still icebergs off the north shore up to the end of July. The ice has made it a disastrous season for fisherman. The federal government has voted \$12,000,000 to their relief.

During the approximately twenty years that Mr. Williams has taught in Millbrook he has made an extensive study of plant life in Cavan township. His particular interest is in bryology, the study of mosslike plants, which includes liverworts as well as true mosses.

Among his important finds is a tiny moss identified for the first time in North America, by him, as Phascum floerkeanum. He found it on the Mars hall Fallis farm in April of 1958. During a mild spell in the Christmas vacation of 1957 he identified a western desert plant, Pterigoneurum ovatum, which he found near the quarterline west of Millbrook. It is the second time this plant has been found in eastern North America.

Mr. Williams is recognized as the leading authority in Canada in the field of liverworts. Articles by him have appeared in "The Bryologist", a quarterly published by the American Bryological Society. He is also a member of the British Bryological Society. Some years ago he collected specimens on the Gaspé peninsula for the national museum. In his own herbaria (collection of dried plants) are some 2,000 specimens. There are probably 200 species of hepatica (liverworts) and 500 specimens of mosses to be found in Ontario.

While Harry Williams was exploring plant life in Newfoundland his 12-year old daughter, Jill, was enjoying a tour which took in parts of England, Scotland and Wales. Others in the party were Mrs. Elaine Nattress, her daughter, Helen, and Mrs. Alice Metcalfe, Ruth Clark's sister.

They saw the crown jewels - on the day before the bomb blast - the next day visitors were excluded.

In Scotland they went as far north as Balmoral Castle where the Queen lives from August to October.

The trip to England was made by 747 jet and the country tour by bus.(D.I.)
