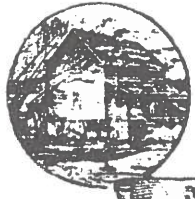

## LAKE ONTARIO CROSSED IN A DIFFERENT MANNER:

Lately the newspaper, radio and TV news broadcasts have been full of accounts of people swimming, or trying to swim, across Lake Ontario. On Labor Day a group of eleven young men decided to conquer its waters in a different manner. In two canoes, six in one and five in the other, they timed themselves paddling the 32½ miles across the Lake. Both crafts, 25' Voyageur canoes, were made in the factory here in the village.

In one were six university students who had been holidaying at Camp Kandelore in northern Ontario. In the other were some local people, Glenn Fallis, veteran canoeist and owner of the Voyageur plant, Paul Caron, plant manager, David Kennedy and David Gregg, both instructors in the camp run by Glenn on weekends on the French River. There the students are taught to handle canoes in "white water", in other words, in the rapids. The youngest in the group taking part in the crossing were two sixteen year olds, the eldest a thirty and a thirty two year old.

They set out from Niagara-on-the-Lake at seven in the morning and arrived at Ontario Place five hours and forty minutes later. They were fortunate to arrive just minutes before the waterfront was cleared for the air show.

Asked if there was any particular purpose in making the trip, they replied that there was not. They just wanted to see how long it would take to do it in canoes, made of fibreglass, it is true, but otherwise replicas of those used by early settlers and fur traders. ( D.I. )

FROM A CHRONICLE OF 1962:

Mr. Reg. Dufty recently unearthed an old foundation when doing some excavating at his service station on the south side of King Street, immediately west of Main Street. Thanks to an article written by Mr. E.S. Clarry, from which we quote, we are able to give Reg. the history of the building that once stood on his site.

"Squire Sowden erected on this particular corner the finest business block the village ever possessed even to this day. Before he finally took his loss on the enterprise he fought a legal battle against a fire insurance company. The building was 70 x 96 feet in size, three stories in height, of solid brick construction with oak floor throughout. The ground floor provided for a hotel, a bank and three stores.
