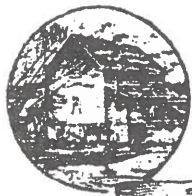

EDUCATION CHANGES ( by Doris Ingham )

There have been many changes in the educational system in this community beginning with the first of September this year. Before 1960 all the grades from one through thirteen were taught in the same building at the top of the hill overlooking the village from the south. Since the building of the new high school on Tupper Street, in 1960, the old building has been simply "Millbrook Public School", but now it has gone through another change. All the children in attendance here this year are from kindergarten just through Grade three. There is a new principal, Mr. Wayne Greenly. Last year's principal in South Cavan school, Mrs. Gladys Larmer, formerly principal at South Cavan retired in June.

Mrs. Roberta Larmer also retired from Millbrook public school staff, and Mrs. Victoria Fowler resigned as kindergarten teacher to spend more time with her young daughter.

Now Mrs. Dorothy Stevens has the kindergarten, Mrs. Eleanor Roode, Grade one, Mrs. Jessie Robinson, Grades one and two, and Mrs. Lola Thexton Grades two and three. In the morning kindergarten class there are children from North Cavan and some from Millbrook. In the afternoon the tots come from South Cavan along with the rest of the Millbrook crowd.

For the first time children attending that school have a playroom on the ground floor, and it has gym equipment. Before the only play areas were in the basement.

There are many changes, too, at the high school. For the first time Grades 7 and 8 will receive instruction on the same grounds as their seniors in high school grades. Three portable classrooms have been set up on the Tupper St. campus, and also Grades 7 and 8 also use one room of the high school. There, for the first time, they rotate for classes between four teachers, Miss Kathy Strader, who teaches art as well as other subjects, Messrs. David McEwen, Brian Snell, and Douglas Davidson. In addition Mr. David Armstrong (not the local one - this one is a cousin of Marie Argue) comes to give each grade four classes a week in oral French. That is another "first" as is instruction in instrumental music, under Mr. Brian Burditt. I can remember about a quarter century ago when the high school students had their own orchestra, but this is an innovation for Grades 7 and 8. It is interesting to hear them talk about their flutes, trombones and so on.

Mr. Paul McMackin is now principal, not just for the high school, but for all grades from 7 through 13. There are only two changes in the high school section staff. Mr. Harry Williams is off on a year's leave of absence, and Mr. Arthur Mueller is replacing him teaching science. Mr. Fred Thomas resigned to take up duties at Port Hope Central school, teaching music half time and regular classes the rest of the time. Mr. Terry Smith replaces him teaching commercial subjects.

Another first for the high school is that it now has a full time library assistant, Mrs. Yvonne Clarke.

Still another "first" is the holding of adult education classes in the high school, evenings. These are open to men, women and students alike. Subjects taught will be, on Tuesday evenings, sewing and typing, and on Thursday art and tin can craft. The classes commence on October first.

1/2 cup sugar, 2/3 cup shortening, 1

olved in 1 cup warm water, 7 cups  
flour.

Mix sugar, shortening, salt and bran.  
Pour over this the boiling water.  
Stir until dissolved. Cool, add  
beaten eggs, dissolved yeast with  
water. Add flour. Put in refriger-  
ator. Take out two hours before us-  
ing. Bake 15 to 20 minutes at 400 d.
