EASY MONEY ? ?

A Toronto newspaper points out that if you have a whole life insurance policy taken out before 1968 there is some easy money for you.

If your policy has a \$5,000 loan value you can borrow that money at 5 or 6% and re-invest it, say, in Canada bonds at over 9%. Of course, in the event of your death the face value is reduced by the amount of the loan, but if you have the loan safely invested, who cares?

This idea isn't welcomed by the insurance companies as they would naturally prefer to get the high return themselves. Policies issued since 1968 have an arrangement to set the rate at the time of the loan.

Before taking out a loan read the terms of your policy carefully and make sure not to take out the cash surrender value of your policy.

Also, it points out that the interest you pay the company on the loan is tax deductible - and while we haven't checked it closely (we're doing no more income tax returns) we think there is something in the last budget that permits you to have investment income of \$1,000 tax free. This will apply, we think, on 1975 income. But check it - we could have misread the tax angle.

ONTARIO PROVINCIAL POLICE REPORT:

The Millbrook O.P.P. investigated the following motor vehicle collisions and occurrences during the period 10th of November and 24th November.

Eighteen motor vehicle collisions were investigated in which eleven persons were injured. As a result of these collisions seven persons have been charged under the Highway Traffic Act and one person has been charged under the Criminal Code.

Forty occurrences of a general nature were also investigated. These included impaired drivers, prowler complaints, insecure premises, high speed complaints, found property, thefts, threatening investigations, break and enters, recovering stolen property including cars, wilful damage and assaults.

Canada Safety Council has given the Chronicle a kit of information on safe driving. We'll pass it on from week to week. Safe Driving Week is Dec, 1st to 7th inclusive. Here's the one item in all the literature that should scare hell out of all drivers - "One out of two people living today will be involved in a crippling or fatal traffic accident."

LADY LIONS CLUB MEETING:

(J. Ferguson - Centre St.)

Old cars, row boats, rubber tires and even fallen trees can all be part of a childrens playground, according to Mrs. R. Wagar, Physical and Health Education Resource Teacher for the County Board of Education. At the regular October meeting of the Lady Lions, Mrs. Wagar spoke about some of the new types of playgrounds being created on some school grounds in Peterborough County, and how these playgrounds play an important part in the mental, physical and emotional development of the children. These playgrounds provide an imaginative area in which the children can hide, stretch, jump, balance, hop, swing, climb, and even build.

Mr. Wayne Greenley, Principal of Millbrook Public School, who was also present at the meeting, expressed a hope that such a play area could be developed throughout this school year for the Kindergarten to Grade 3 pupils. The Lady Lions decided to help sponsor the start of Phase 1 of an imaginative playground for Millbrook Public School. A committee of three Lady Lions was set up and a sum of money set aside for the purpose of providing some of the materials which need to be purchased, and to scrounge much of the material which is usually free.

The Lady Lions also filled a need for our Senior Citizens for covers for bridge tables. It seems that these are very hard to come by in the size for card tables. Our Senior Citizens can also look forward to an after-the-New-Year activity by the Lady Lions in the form of a Valentine Party.

After a long business meeting the Lady Lions relaxed and bagged candy for the annual Halloween shell out sponsored by the Lions in the Millbrook Legion each year.

MILLBROOK HIGH SCHOOL COMMENCEMENT:

In her valedictory address Carol Clifford said she was really speaking for all graduates, now scattered all over Ontario - not just for herself. She reminded them and herself that the most important thing to remember was to allot their time wisely. She said university was the total learning experience.

Someone once told her "If you want to have fun, go to university, and it is also true if you want to study and get a good education go to university".

She paid tribute to Millbrook High School, she said "it breathes independency and capability".

HIGH SCHOOL PARENTS & RATEPAYERS:

At at meeting of the above association the desirability of obtaining a gymnasium was discussed. At present 225 students from Grade Seven through Thirteen are attending there. The gymnasium could double as an auditorium, eliminating the need to hold two assemblies. The students could all be accomodated at one time. The gym could also be used for the presentation of plays and could be rented out for community use. Helen Kennedy, the chairman, reported that she had received \$25, a 20 cent per capita grant on last year's enrolment. She asked for suggestions on how the money should be spent. It was decided to use it as an award to be presented at commencement exercises to the most deserving student entering the field of education. Already awards are given in many other areas such as nursing and science but so far there has not been one for prospective teachers. This year's grant will amount to \$45.00.

It was decided to appoint Betty Armstrong, who now serves as secretary, to be the association's treasurer, as well.

Principal Paul McMackin reported that there would be night classes in sewing and tin craft. (Doris Ingham)

THE YEAR OF THE CRUNCH:

Alex. Carruthers, chairman of the Ontario Select Committee on Motorized Snow Vehicles and AllTerrain Vehicles reports that the following regulations will be implemented by the provincial government in the present session:

Snowmobile operators will be required to obtain written permission from the owner of private property before entering the property.

Upon request of the property owner the snowmobile operator will be required to identify himself and produce the written permission to cross the property.

Where a complaint of trespassing is made, the Crown will assume responsibility for investigation and prosecution.

A property owner will not be responsible for injuries sustained by any snowmobile operator provided the land owner does not maliciously plan to cause injury.

Damage caused by a snowmobile will be the liability of both the operator and the owner of the vehicle.
