## MILLBROOK ELECTION RESULT:

A small number of voters turned out on Monday to elect a council for the village - for the next two years. Bob Carr again led the polls by rolling up a total of 217 votes, followed by Gerry Deyell with 176, Rod McDowell - 169, and Lyle Nattress with 159 votes. These four will make up the council, with Ken Blair acclaimed as reeve. Defeated candidates were Reg. Dufty with 125 votes, Bill Clarke 122 and Eric Warburton with 114.

An examination of the results would indicate that length of residence in the village was a governing factor. Each of the four elected are lifetime residents of the area, although Reg. Dufty with 23 years residence hardly qualifies as a Johnny-come-lately. The two who trailed are comparative new comers.

Pre-election "if elected" statements suggests that there is ample support for a town park and playground for children. Newcomer Rod McDowell hopes to promote better relations between the village and the Township of Cavan and this is a very laudable objective.

## TOWNSHIP OF CAVAN RESULT:

The election in Cavan returned the same members to council - with reeve Olan and deputy reeve Winslow retaining their seats by acclamation. Re-elected were Sherman Morrison (375), William Walker (341), and Harold Hooton (304.) John Pritchard (208) and Clifford Tripp (142) were defeated.

PORRIDGE BREAD

3 cups boiling water  
2 cups rolled oats  
1/4 cup shortening  
2 tsp. sugar  
1 cup lukewarm water  
2 packages dry yeast  
2/3 cup table molasses  
4 tsp. salt  
8 to 8 1/2 cups all purpose flour

Pour boiling water over rolled oats  
and shortening. Stir until shorten-  
ing melts and let stand for about 20  
minutes, stirring occasionally.  
Meanwhile, dissolve 2 tsp sugar in  
lukewarm water. Over this, sprinkle  
dry yeast. Let stand for ten minutes.  
Then stir briskly with a fork.  
Stir table molasses and salt into  
partially cooled rolled oat mixture.  
Cool to lukewarm. Add softened yeast  
to the lukewarm rolled oat mixture.  
Stir.

Beat in 2 1/2 cups all purpose flour.  
Beat vigorously by hand or with el-  
ectric mixer. Then gradually beat in  
with a spoon an additional 5 to 6  
cups all purpose flour. Work in last  
of flour with a rotating motion of  
the hand.

Turn dough on to a floured surface and  
knead 8 to 10 minutes. Shape into a  
smooth ball and place in a greased  
bowl, rotating dough to grease sur-  
face.

Cover and let rise until doubled -  
about 1 1/2 hours - Keep in a warm place.  
Punch down and shape into four loaves.  
Place in greased 8 1/2 x 4 1/2 inch loaf  
pan, grease tops, cover and let  
rise again until doubled (about 1  
hour). Bake in a preheated 400 degrees  
F. oven for 30 to 35 minutes. Makes  
four loaves.
