ONTARIO PROVINCIAL POLICE REPORT:

The Millbrook O.P.F. investigated the following motor vehicle collisions and occurrences during the period Nov. 24 to December 6th.

Seventeen motor vehicle collisions were investigated in which there were five Highway Traffic Act charges laid.

Thirty three occurrences of a general nature were investigated. Some of these occurrences were as follows; property damage, recovered stolen vehicles; civil disputes, break and enter; prowler complaints; assaults and impaired drivers.

Other activities concerned investigations into reports of lost and found properties, domestic disputes and property checks.

Eleven persons have been charged under the liquor control act; five persons have been charged under the criminal code act and four persons charged with driving offences under the criminal code.
