SALARIES SET FOR CAVAN COUNCIL

Cavan council has set the salaries for 1979

with a review set for December. After several motions, final

agreement was reached on a motion by Councillor Alex Ruth and

seconded by Councillor Arthur Kilgour that council will be paid a total of \$11,000 plus mileage of 18 cents per mile for any township business.

Reeve Sherman Morrison voted in favor of the motion with Councillors Don Cathcart and John Pritchard opposed. Each member of the five-man council will receive \$183.33 per month plus their mileage expenses which should amount to about \$1,000 total annually.

The salary budget for 1978 was set at \$18,000, but by the end of November, council had spent \$12,990.60 of that amount excluding mileage. In 1977, however, council had spent \$16,917 for salaries including mileage and meals. There was an additional \$3,000 spent for conventions which are not included in salary budgets.

Cathcart was opposed in principle to salaries fearing that stormy nights or other minor reasons might keep a councillor at home if he were paid regardless of attendance. Ruth was quick to point out that he was elected to serve the people and would never slight the people in that way. He said he would stand on past performance.

Pritchard was not against the salaries idea, just the amounts suggested. "For instance," he said, "I attended five meetings last month. One regular and four committee

meetings." His motion of \$250 per month received no seconder.

There was a discussion as to why those who sit on the Library Board or the Recreation Committee receive no pay while other committees such as arena board are paid.

The decision to go with salaries rather than a per meeting basis will not eliminate that discrepancy.

Freelove hired as caretaker

Four bylaws were passed at the Cavan council meeting concerning the following items in brief.

79-1 For the validations of deeds, the fee will now be \$50.

79-2 The hiring of Harry Freelove on 3 months' probation as the caretaker of Cavan Township Hall. The salary to be \$2,400 per annum and caretaker to be working at the direction of the township clerk.

79-3 The hiring of Wayne C. Walker as Garbage Disposal Site Attendant on 3 months' probation, at the rate of \$4.33 per hour during regular disposal site hours. He will administer all regulations pertaining to the site.

79-4 Snow Bylaw - Prohibiting the obstruction of roads, dumping on ditches or culverts.

Wintario costing Town money

Wintario money committed to the Orono and Newcastle arenas by the provincial government has yet to be received by the Town of Newcastle, announced Mayor Garnet Rickard at a meeting this week.

"The fund-raising was in order, and both projects were approved by Wintario," he added.

Inquiries by the mayor, Councillor Keith Barr and Klaus DeGroot, treasurer, have so far failed to find any reason why the Wintario accounts have not been paid.

Mayor Rickard suggested that office and staff changeovers at Wintario may have something to do with the delay. (Wintario offices have moved from Toronto to Peterborough).

Under Wintario agreements the Town must pay for the accounts covered by the Wintario grant and will be reimbursed at a later date.

Town buildings are a 'mess' -- Ivan Hobbs

The condition of certain municipal buildings in Bowmanville is a disgrace, commented a town councillor after reading town manager Albert Guiler's report on the inspection of public buildings.

Ivan Hobbs told members of the Finance and Administration Committee on Monday that he'd never seen a public building (the police and fire building) in such a mess.

Because Wintario has not re-imbursed the Town, money for the two arenas had to be borrowed from the bank at an 11 per cent interest rate. The interest cannot be reimbursed by Wintario, claims Mayor Rickard.

Frustrated in their attempts to deal with Wintario, the Town has asked MPP Sam Cureatz to look into the matter.

A report from Cureatz is expected this week.

Guiler's report revealed that certain areas in the police and fire building had not been cleaned for several weeks. In addition the inspection discovered tiles loose or missing, drapes missing or in need of cleaning and the carpet in courtroom one in need of repair.

Although most of the discussion centered on the police and fire building, a report on the Bowmanville Town Hall was also presented.

Guiler has advised committee members that in addition to requiring a fresh coat of paint on the Town Hall, repairs to the roof should be made, unused antennae removed and a humane way of getting rid of the pigeons be found.

While some councillors asked that repairs to the buildings be made when a new budget is drawn up Councillor Hobbs said, "A leaky roof should be repaired immediately because it could run into more costs later on."

Bowmanville and Hampton arenas were also inspected. Hampton's arena was given a clean bill of health, but a large crack in the south exterior wall of Bowmanville Arena has prompted the town manager to recommend a structural evaluation be made.

Town may hire cleaning staff

In view of the maintenance problems discovered in municipal buildings the Finance and Administration Committee in the Town of Newcastle are discussing the possibility of hiring a maintenance staff for municipal buildings.

Mayor Garnet Rickard told committee members that last year's council also recommended that a maintenance man be hired, but there was not enough money in the budget to carry out this recommendation.

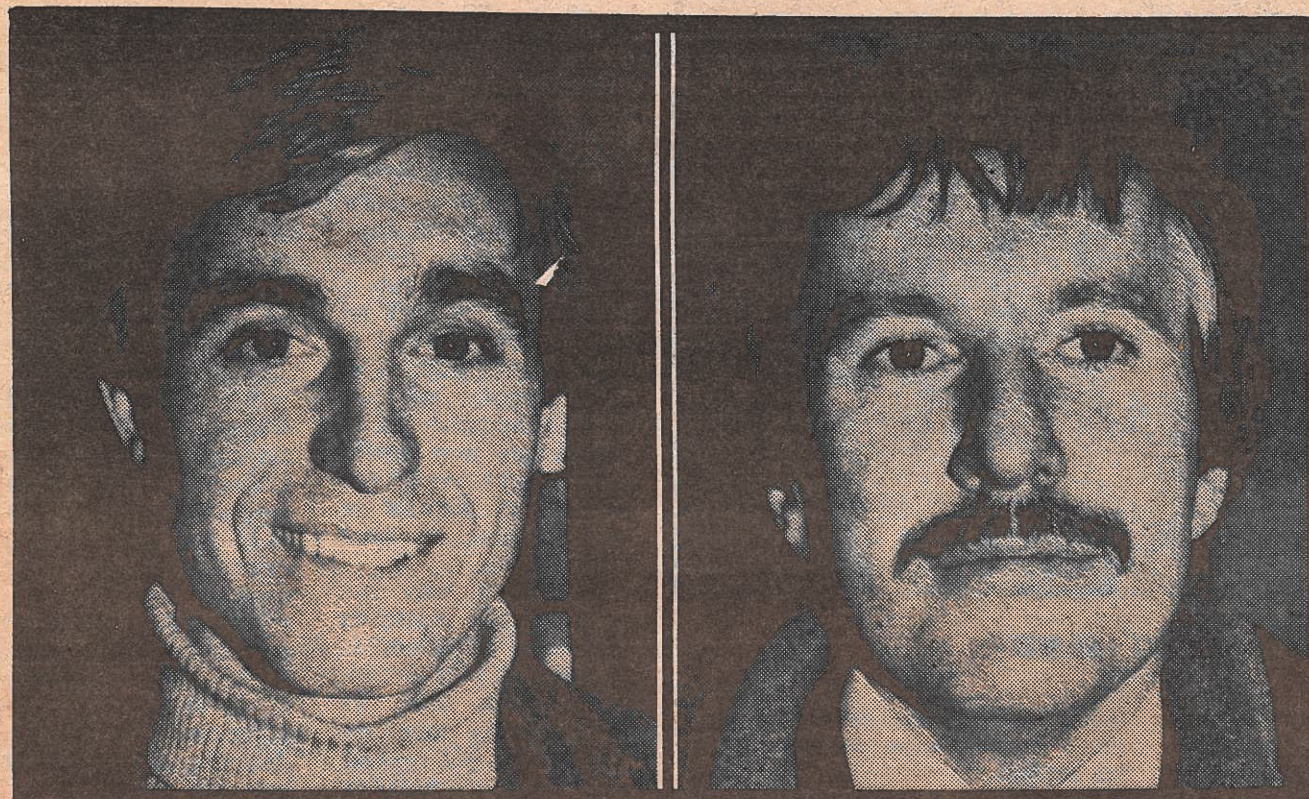
