Charged with cruelty to animals

A 31-year-old Bailieboro man has been charged with causing unnecessary suffering to animals after nine goats and three turkeys were found dead from starvation in a locked barn last week, say Millbrook provincial police.

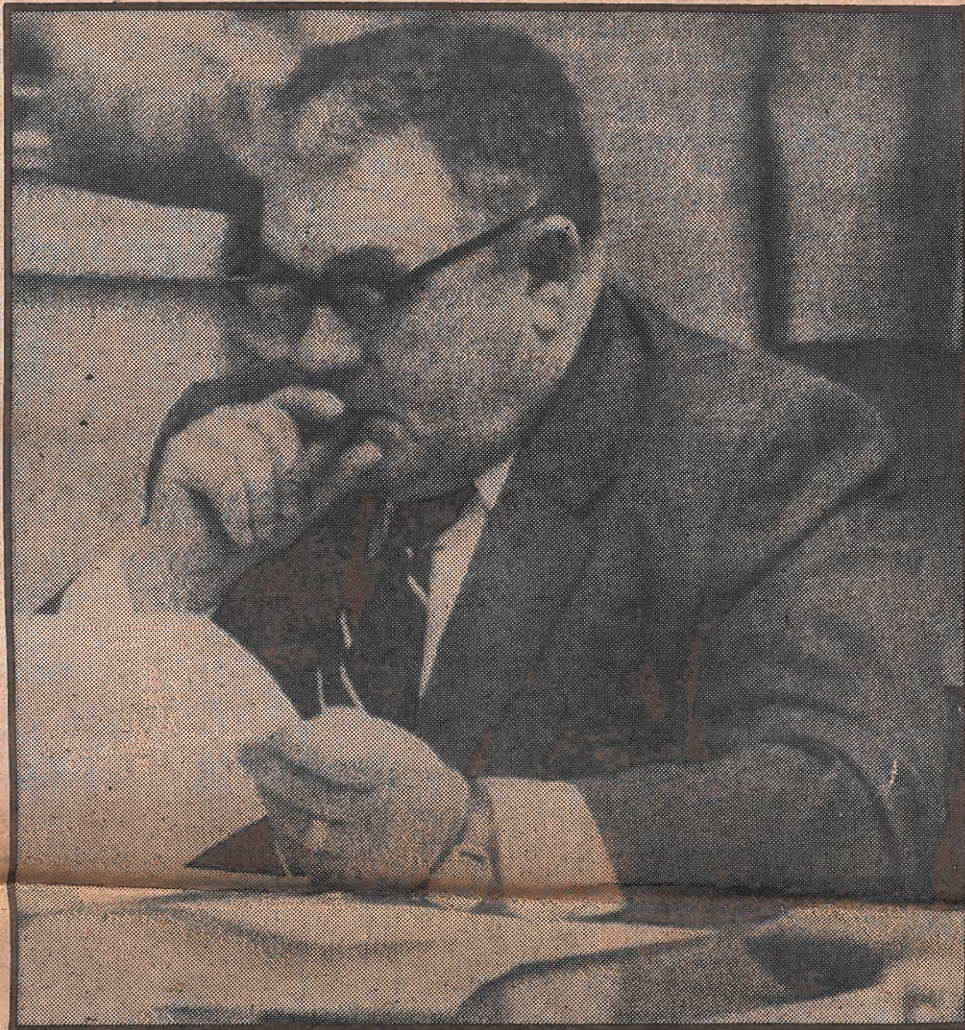
Charged in connection with the incidents is Barry David Heaslip of RR1 Bailieboro. Heaslip had left the farm three or four weeks ago but returned when he heard of the incident through the media. He had been staying in Peterborough.

Police say that the situation came to light when a neighbor, Glenn Manley, who was renting a barn on the farm, found a dog locked in it.

Three goats, a horse and a donkey were also found on the farm by officials from the Peterborough and Whitby Humane Societies and were taken to the Newmarket Humane Society farm.

The dog, 20 pounds overweight, was taken to the Peterborough Humane Society.

Heaslip will answer charges in Peterborough provincial court on February 20.

CAVAN FREEZE GETS THAWED

Cavan Twp. has received written notification from the Ministry of Housing that the Restrictive Zoning Order placed on the Twp. in July 1975 has been rescinded. This restriction has been commonly referred to as the "Cavan Freeze".

This will now mean that property owners may apply for building permits on those lots which have been recommended by the

Ontario Municipal Board.

Cavan Council has indicated that it intends to follow the recommendations of the OMB.

Twp. Planner Tom Robinson has stated that the amended bylaw will be ready for presentation to Council by the end of January.

Teachers settle on contract

After 17 hours of hard bargaining with mediator Harvey Ladd which began Friday morning at 9:00 a.m. and ended around 2:00 a.m. on Saturday at the Greenwood Tower, a memorandum of agreement has been reached between the bargaining committee for the 578 elementary school teachers and the Northumberland-Newcastle Board of Education.

School board business administrator James Bird said today that the board's negotiating committee didn't expect

ratification of the new agreement until Jan. 25, when both the teachers and the board are expected to meet to approve the contract offer.

The business administrator was not at liberty to disclose the terms of the new agreement until after the board and the teachers had met and approved it.

He described the successful elementary negotiations as being like getting one log out of a log jam. The board and the teachers are expected to be

right back at the bargaining table again on Feb. 1 to begin another round with the elementary school teachers on next year's contract.

In the meantime, the board still has to settle its contract dispute with its 252 secondary school teachers. Talks broke off between the board and the high school teachers just before Christmas as both sides were nearing a settlement.

Both the elementary and secondary school teachers have been without a contract since last August 31.
