On Sunday March 8, 1987 St. Andrew's United Church opened its doors, while the community opened its hearts to honour one of the area's oldest residents.

The church hall was beautifully decorated with colourful ribbons and daintily set tables. A large banner bordered with birds and flowers proclaimed, the best wished of all 'Happy Hundredth Birthday Zella'.

Mrs. Bentley, with her attendants occupied chairs positioned before a background of attractive plants and flowers. On either side were Mrs. Iva Reid, representing the Rebekah Lodge, of which Zella has been a member since 1915, and Mrs. Lola Thexton, President of the U.C.W. of which Zella is a life member. At the register, Mrs. Marie Argue and Mrs. Florence Ball officiated, while at the door Mrs. Mildred Tully greeted the guests.

Displays of memorabilia were on view, and aided many fond memories. Attracting much at-

tention was a photo of Zella at ninety-two, in suitable attire riding a snowmobile!

Rev. Piercy, of St. Andrews, called the gathering together with a welcome and a convocation prayer.

Mrs. Cathy MacGregor, member of Township Council, was the Master of Ceremonies. Her sparkling wit and commentary added much as she read the many messages of congratulations and introduced the many presentations.

Of first interest was a telegram from the Queen, which brought a gasp of astonishment from the recipient, followed by a wink and the observation. 'After this, I'll find it hard to talk to ordinary people!'

Certificates and messages of congratulations were received from Prime Minister Brian Mulroney, the Hon. Allan Lawrence, M.P.P. Mr. Turner's message was presented by Mrs. Doris Brick, Reeve of Ennismore. At the local level, George Branscombe, representing Millbrook Council made a presentation of an engraved brass flower pot, with flowers. Victor Norman, Reeve of Cavan

Township presented her with an engraved plaque. Wilf Gillis, Deputy Reeve of Cavan Township presented her with a bouquet of cut flowers. Other clubs, organizations and businesses presented tributes, each and all bringing exclamation of astonishment and appreciation from the honoured guest.

Previous United Church ministers who attended were Rev. Melville Butler of Oshawa; Rev. John Oestreicher and family of Norwood, Rev. Buchanan of Bellville and Rev. Bridges of Norwood, Rev. Douglas Michell of Essex was unable to be present, but sent best wishes.

Friends and relatives from Picton area attended. Oldest among her guests was long time friend, Mrs. Helen Fisher of Peterborough soon to be ninety! The youngest was two year old Melinda Blair, daughter of Ken and Connie Blair of Millbrook.

When ceremonies concluded, Rev. Piercy said the blessing, everyone sang 'Happy Birthday', and a sumptuous lunch followed. A birthday cake, lavishly iced and beautifully

decorated reposed beneath the birthday banner. A social time followed and the party atmosphere was much in evidence.

Mrs. Bentley was born Zella May Morden in Prince Edward County, on March 5 1887 at 11 o'clock on a blustery Saturday morning. She came to Millbrook in 1908, the bride of Percy J. Bentley and they operated a hardware store until 1944 when, due to Mr. Bentley's failing health, they were obliged to sell. In semi-retirement, Mr. Bentley accepted the office of Clerk-Treasurer for the Township; and Zella became his ever present aide.

When he passed away in 1952, Mrs. Bentley was implored to 'carry on'. She accepted on a temporary basis - a basis which resulted in sixteen years of unselfishness to a task she had always loved. At eighty she retired. Today she has many laurels to her credit. One

much cherished is her membership in the Rebekah Lodge, and she founded the Golden Chapter in Millbrook in 1917. She is a charter member of the Red Cross.

Mrs. Bentley has been active in business, serving her village, her community, her church and her lodges, giving her all to every undertaking, yet never losing that admirable quality of being a wonderful wife, a faithful friend and a gracious lady.

The occasion closed with Zella rising to express her appreciation to all who had a part in making the day so memorable.

It is certain that the wishes of all are best said in a quote in part, from the message of Rev. Mitchell - 'May God continue to bless you with good health and abundant and happy years. You are, and have been an inspiration to all those who have had the good fortune to know you.'

Women Helping Women

Women helping women is a project designed to learn the needs of women who have low incomes and/or housing problems, plus other social concerns.

The first stage of research is to discover if there is a need for advocacy or lifestyle education or a 'safe place' for women to express fears and to learn their rights. Research Coordinator Susan Best stated, 'We have circulated a general survey and ascertained that we do have a target audience in sole support moms and women 40 - 60 years. Now we have to define their specific needs and barriers they experience, hence, a drop-in for personal documentation.'

A second stage of the project

will be to assist women to develop the 'enabling self-help programs they require and have not been able to find among the existing services in Peterborough.'

This short term project is sponsored by the Peterborough Women's Committee and funded by the Secretary of State. The main office is 1068 Oriole Dr., Peterborough, K9H 6L2, and the phone number is 745-7432.

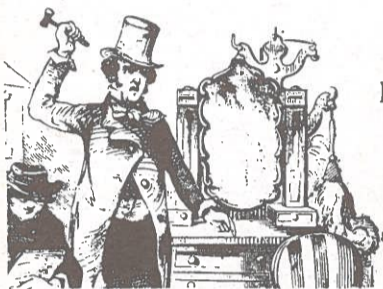

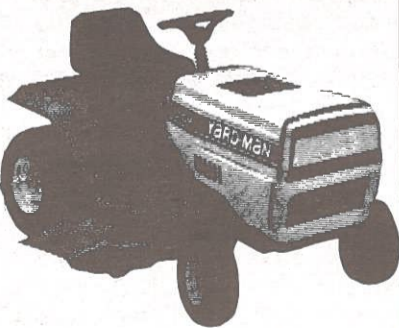

'A wise nation preserves its records - so giving your best today is sure to better tomorrow', was the motto Mrs. Gerald Larmer, curator of the Millbrook Women's Institute, chose for her topic at the March meeting held in the Municipal Hall.

Lady Tweedsmuir was responsible for introducing the idea of gathering historical community data and compiling the information into book form. Later, at the request of the Provincial Board, she suggested that they be called 'Tweedsmuir Histories', then history books began at Branch, District, Area and Provincial levels.

Today, Tweedsmuir Histories in Ontario are considered authentic, historical data and recognized by the Ministry of Education as a true source of information for students.

Women's Institutes are grateful to the foresight of Lady Tweedsmuir and her support

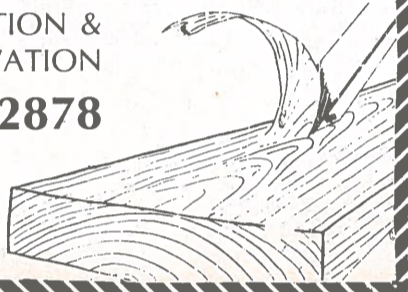

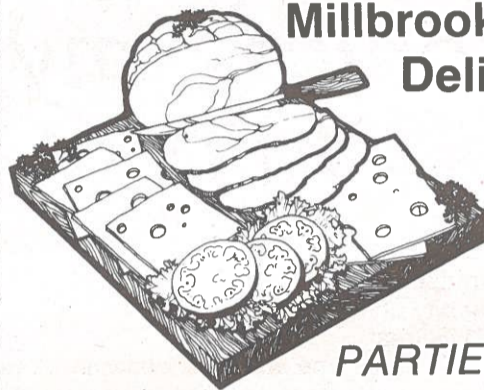

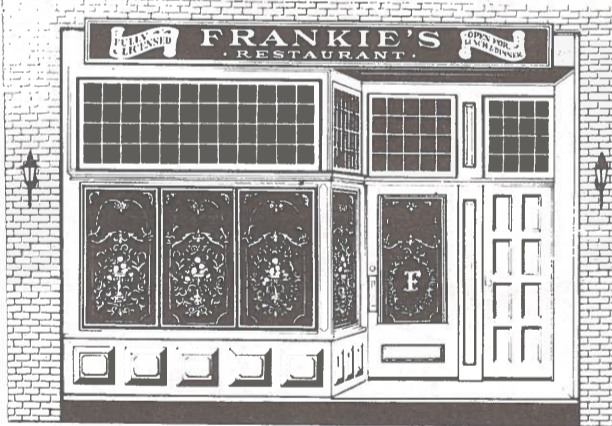

Even though it was a very long day for her, she looked forward to her outings in the city. On these occasions, she would buy her groceries, go to the hairdressers, pay her bills and always have lunch at the Eaton's restaurant. Once every ten weeks, she would have an appointment with her foot doctor. She always got a tickle out of telling people that her foot doctor was ironically named 'Dr. Foot'.

much enjoyed stroll along Cedar Valley Road. These walks, she said, were therapy for her body and mind. I'm sure that they contributed to her reaching the ripe age of eighty-seven.

Even though, in the last few months, I could see that her body was getting weaker, I admired that never dying inner strength always to continue on and do for herself; always trying no matter how difficult the task; always wanting to do it for herself even when friends offered to lighten the load.

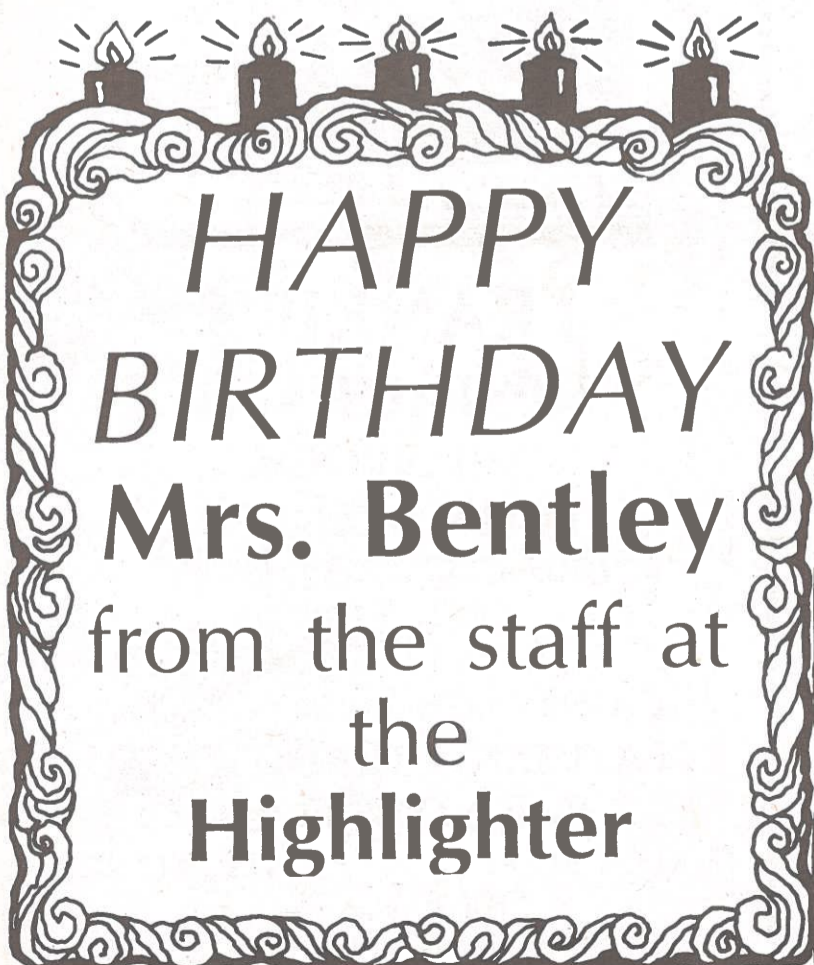

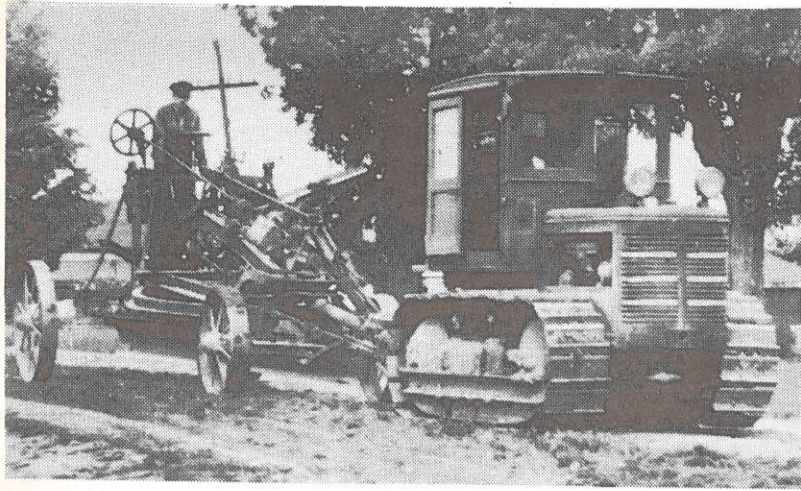

Cavan Road Crew History

We left the history of the Cavan Township road crew in the late 1940's when Lambert Gibson retired from his position

of road superintendent for the township of Cavan and the United Counties of Durham Northumberland. Mr. Gibson was replaced by Harry Tulley.

In the late 1940's the township acquired its first road grader. The grader graded roads and helped in ditching. The grader was a Leaning Wheel Sawyer Massey Grader and was pulled by a tractor.

At the same time the township purchased its own stone crusher. The stone crusher, crushed stones to gravel the roads. The roads were gravelled by using horses and wagons and shovelling the gravel onto the road by hand. The same tractor that pulled the plough and the grader also drove the crusher. Wilford Gillis commented, 'It was a very busy tractor and it's no wonder it wore out quickly.'



Movement gains momentum

The February meeting of Millbrook People for Peace was notable for its abundance of fresh ideas and a feeling of renewed commitment.

The group had clearly been impressed by the visit of SAGE (Students Against Global Extermination) to Millbrook. These four high school students -- who are criss-crossing the country to try to motivate other students

around peace and disarmament issues -- were impressive not only in the strength of their commitment but also in their organizational skills.

Noting that 'peace begins at home,' members set up a committee to study the idea of holding a workshop for children on non-violent conflict resolution.

Another committee was set up to recommend ways that we can communicate to political candidates our concerns about peace issues. Members agreed that lobbying politicians is pro-

bably the most effective thing we can do to promote our views on peace issues.

Also, it was decided that we would sponsor a public showing of the film 'Return to Dresden', along with a panel discussion. More on this later.

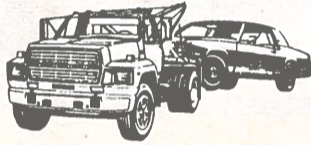

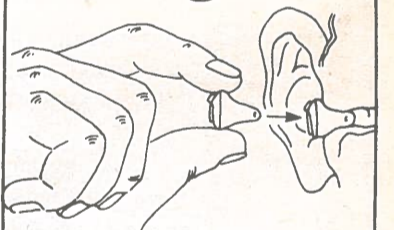

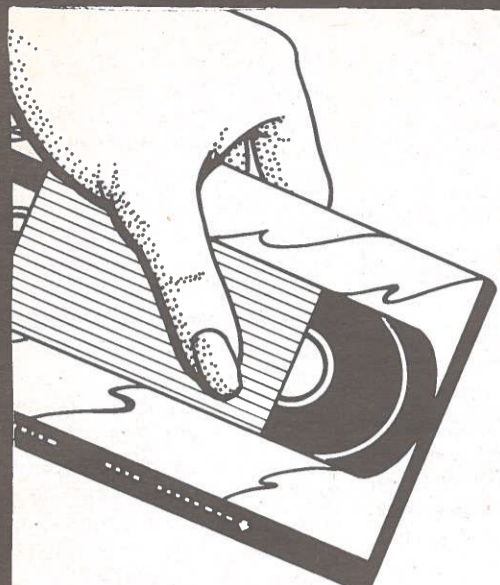

**Musical Notes
by George Ingham**

In accordance with my recent penchant for discussing personal favorites among musicians and musical organizations I should like today to dwell upon the subject of symphony orchestras and conductors.

My personal favorite among all orchestras is at the moment the Vienna Philharmonic. Here is an orchestra of great beauty and flexibility of sound, and its expressivity contrasts with, for example, the hard driven precision of such organizations such as, say the Berlin Philharmonic.

Even under the direction of such a conductor as Leonard Bernstein (whom I consider to be positively the least talented of all popular orchestra conductors) the interpretation comes through with shining colors.

To do justice to Bernstein, though, I believe he always had good interpretation ideas as his recording as pianist with the Juillard string quartet of Schumann's Piano Quintet proves, but poor discipline in the New Philharmonic under his direction always gave the impression that he was a conductor who favored a poor level of unanimity and harsh woodwind sounds. (He is, by contrast, a fine composer.)

Previous to this infatuation, my favorite orchestra was the Cleveland orchestra under George Szell, but since his death this orchestra's odysseys under various conductors have entirely changed the character of the performances.

Many orchestral musicians have been heard to point out

"Our orchestra always sounds well under a great conductor." Appointments of orchestral conductors (note particularly the case of the Berlin Philharmonic) used often to be for the lifetime of the conductor, but the higher standards of orchestral playing achieved today surely prove the wisdom of switching conductors and orchestras around for variety both as regards tenures of music directors, and the coming of guest conductors throughout the season. Once a music director has "spilled all his beans" with a given organization, he must realize the time has come to move on, unless he is a profound musical scholar who can be trusted to come up with fresh interpretive ideas in perpetuity.

Amongst conductors I have enjoyed the work of Lorin Maazel (who seems lately to be losing his grip), Klaus Tenstedt, Carlos Kleiber, Sir Charles Mackerras, Claudio Abado, and Ricardo Shii. Amongst Baroque specialists, John Elliot Gardiner's work intrigues me, especially that with the Monteverdi choir in his recording of Handel's Messiah.

Sometimes one hears the perfect conductor with the perfect orchestra. The sound of precision and elan of Toscanini playing even second rate music with the N.B.C. Symphony orchestra will remain with me for a lifetime. The other day I heard via radio Ricardo Shii conducting Tchaikowsky's Fifth Symphony with the Vienna Philharmonic. Favorite composition! Favorite conductor! Favorite orchestra! A truly unforgettable experience!!!

Readers will have noticed of Canadian orchestras and conductors, I may say briefly that I am not overwhelmed by the spectacular recording success of the Montreal Symphony under Charles Dutoit. I tend to regard this phenomenon a simple extension of the activity of Dutoit's teacher, Ernest Ansermet with the renowned Swiss Romande Orchestra.

What did surprise me was a recent world class performance by the Toronto Symphony under the direction of Kurt Sanderling of two major works by Brahms on the night of November 1, 1986 when I, with others from this area was privileged to be in the audience.

Anglers and hunters fear Animal Rights Mvt

Anglers, hunters and trappers are responding to what they perceive as a direct threat posed by an animal rights movement that demands all use of animals be stopped.

A press release from the Ontario Federation of Anglers and Hunters said that, at the group's 59th annual conference in Ottawa, Ontario sportsmen began participating in a common band to oppose what they call irrational attacks. Representatives of the Ontario Trappers Association attended the conference, and Kirk Smith of the Fur Institute of Canada gave a keynote address for a session on animal rights.

Mr. Smith encouraged the anglers and hunters to become active in opposing animal rights, a movement he described as a revolutionary and violent

political program that aims to eliminate all use of animals. He said, 'Activists have targeted for attack all fur, all wildlife use, factory farming, zoos, the circus, (and) laboratory research. If we do not effectively defend and promote the conservation ethic, we will be forced to relinquish our responsibility to manage wildlife.'

According to the release, the audience of anglers and hunters showed a keen interest in cooperating with other groups to meet the threat posed by animal rights. The O.F.A.H. is a member of the Fur Institute and Federation members are reportedly aware of the threat posed to both hunting and fishing by both animal rights activists and preservationists, whom they call the 'soft core' of the animal rights movement.

O.F.A.H. Executive Vice President Rick Morgan said, 'It really shook some of our members to see a television clip of an animal rights activist saying that fishing should be banned as the cruelest of all sports. People knew that hunting was threatened, but few suspected that fishing was under pressure as well.'

'It's clear now that animal rights threatens our entire society -- they want to change our diet, our medical care, our recreation. We can't afford to wait until the public begins to respond to activists' demands to become vegetarians. The time to act is now, and the O.F.A.H. will be working with other organizations to explain our own activities, and expose the real agenda of animal rights.'

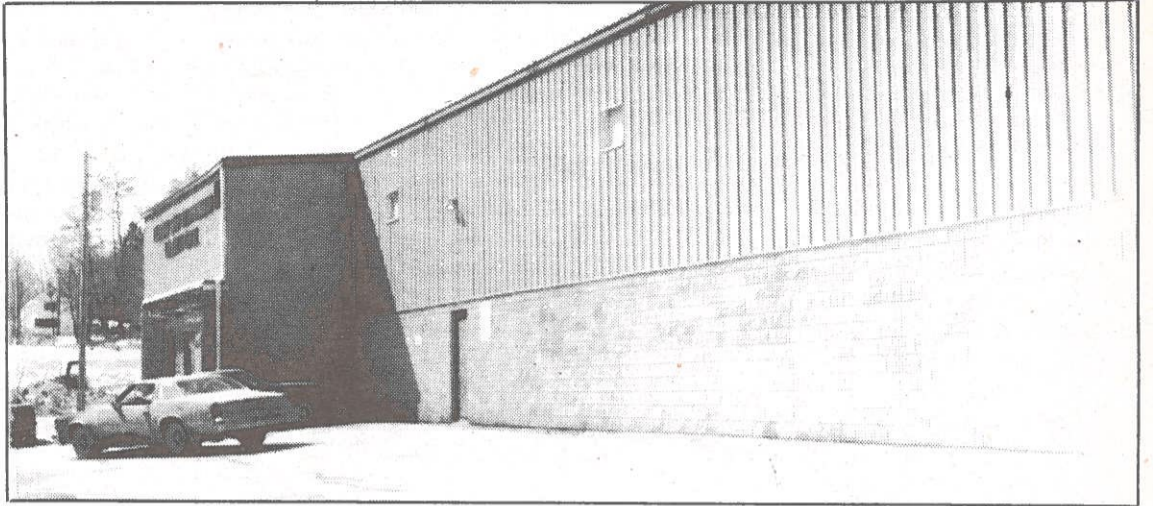

Such a decrease can be very damaging to the facility.

Mr. Wells points out a number of improvements that have been made. The arena deficit was cut in half in 1986, from a 1985 deficit of \$32,000; the updated 1986 deficit was \$18,000. Improvements have been made in order to put ice in sooner and keep it in longer. Bill says the quality of ice is much better as well. 'A lot of money has been

spent in repairs but the only way for people to see the improvements is to come to the events and see for themselves,' says Wells.

Not only has the deficit been cut in half but the arena now has \$35,000 in the reserve fund in case of major capital expenditures. 'Even though we have the major expenditures covered,' says Wells, 'it's the operating costs and minor

repairs that are costing and we need the participation from the public.'

User groups are also getting concerned. Public participation in things such as minor hockey is down this year. These user groups also need the participation from the public to pay for their ice time, uniforms, whatever. All they want is people to come out for the games, demonstrations, carnivals.

Millbrook is Applying for Junior C Franchise

Millbrook has a chance to pick up a Junior C Hockey franchise this April. Bewdley had the franchise but has let it lapse and has offered it to Millbrook. Millbrook must have its proposal into the

Ontario Hockey Association (OHA) by the end of April.

A Junior C team would provide something for Minor Hockey to work toward. Right now there is nothing beyond Minor Hockey besides Mens' Hockey and Oldtimers. Junior C would provide a stepping stone to upper levels of hockey or scholastic scholarships.

The organization needs peo-

ple to help to set it up. 'The more the merrier' says arena manager Bill Wells.

Mr. Wells feels that a hockey franchise would be beneficial to the village and is trying to get more people interested in it. A meeting will be held the first Monday in April at 7:30 upstairs at the arena. Hopefully, the village will be able to put a team together to start in September.

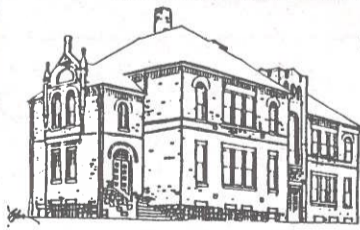

Preparations Begin for the Fair

The Millbrook Fair plans are now in the works. Contests and displays are being planned for the Fair on Friday June 12, Saturday, June 13 and Sunday June 14.

The School Exhibit is sponsored this year by the Millbrook Agricultural Society with the cooperation of the Elementary School Teachers.

Writing classes are writing in pencil for grades 1 to 4 and writing in ink for grades 5 to 8. Grade 1's are required to print 4-6 lines on primary paper, grade 2's must write 8 - 10 lines also on primary paper, grade 3's and 4's will be required to write 12 - 16 lines on foolscap. Grade 5's and 6's will write 12 - 16 lines in ink on foolscap and Grade 7's and 8's will write approximately 20 lines. Entrants are asked to please write their name, grade, school, and township on the back of the sheet; an entry card must be properly folded and fastened to the front of the sheet. Prizes for the writing contests: 1st place \$1.00, 2nd place \$.75, 3rd place \$.50 and ribbons for 4th, 5th and 6th places. Writing exhibits must be delivered to the Millbrook High School on or before May 21, 1987.

The poster contest will be in two categories, Junior for grades 1 - 4 and Senior for grades 5 - 8. Posters are to be approximately 12' X 18' showing the Name, Place and Dates of the Fair (Millbrook Fair, Millbrook Ont., June 12, 13, 14, 1987.) Posters will not be returned as they will be put up for display.

The collection category will be divided into two classes, Class 29 for grades 1 - 4 and Class 30 for grades 5 - 8. The Collection must be a group of Science articles on one theme - mounted and labelled.

There are a number of open classes which are as follows: Class 31 - Object for a Science Fair Display, class 32 - String Art, class 33 - a small woven article using wool, scraps, paper, etc., class 34 - decorated vase, class 35 - handmade puppet, class 36 - a decorated bar of soap, class 37 - a useful article made from a plastic bottle, class 38 - a refrigerator ornament, class 39 - floral decoration (paper, cloth, felt etc.), class 40 - no-bake cookies, 3 suitably wrapped, class 41 - no-bake squares, 4 suitably wrapped, class 42 - decorated cup cakes, 3 suitably wrapped, class 43 - baked squares, any variety, 4 suitably wrapped, class 44 - Tea biscuits, plain, 4 suitably wrapped, class 45 - design 'gift wrap' for a birthday, class 46 - grade 1-4 picture making 'My Favorite Pet' with story or poem attached, class 47 - grade 5-8 picture making 'My Favorite Pet' with story or poem attached, class 48 - grade 1-4 a craft of your own choice, not included in any of the above classes. Age and Grade in full view, class 49 - grade 5-8 a craft of your own choice, not included in any of the above classes, age and grade in full view, class 50 - K-8 paper sculpture using roll of paper towel or toilet tissue, the SPECIAL class is a chocolate cake with prizes of \$10.00,

\$5.00 and \$3.00 donated by Calhoun's IGA.

A spelling match will be held on Friday June 12th, at Education Day. Schools with 50 or more pupils in a grade may send 2 pupils per grade, schools with less per grade may send 1 per grade. In case of illness or if the winner does not show up, the first runner up should be prepared to spell in the contest. Each student should come supplied with his/her own tag which should include the person's name, school and grade. Prizes for the Junior Spelling Contest grades 3, 4, 5 are \$5.00, \$3.00 and \$2.00, donated by Victor Norman of Baillieboro. 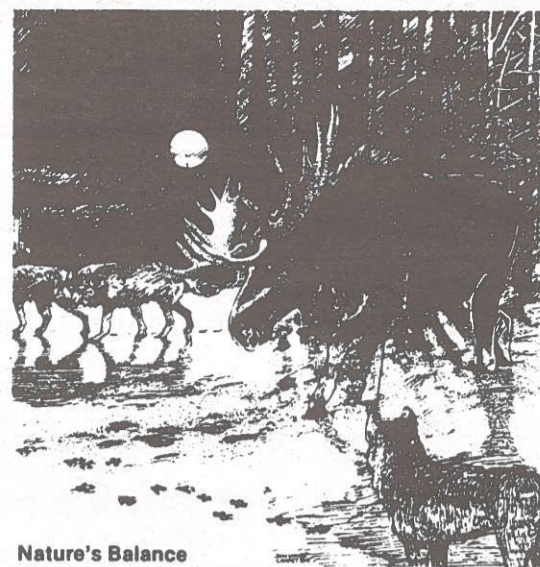

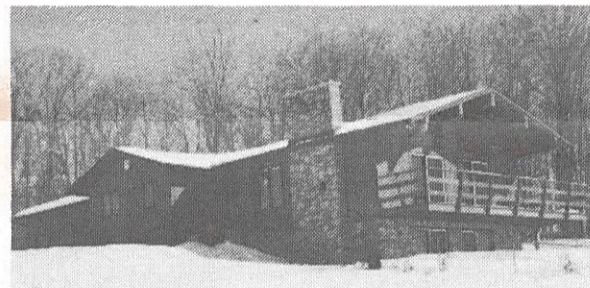
